5 attributes of successful partnerships to achieve SDGs



Strategic

maximizing each stakeholder's strengths, ensuring that needs and expertise are matched



Action-oriented

ensuring that there is clarity on the objectives/targets before the partnership is established



Data-driven

tracking progress, measuring achievements, and ensuring that the partnership is on the right track



Accountable

providing stakeholders with the necessary reporting mechanisms and holding them accountable



Transparent

promoting information and data sharing and fostering collaborations that are focused on achieving shared goals

Best practices

The UAE has taken important steps towards advancing the SDGs and this commitment relies heavily on strategic partnerships among multiple sectors and entities, including the federal government, the private sector, and international, regional and local organizations.

Real time examples include:



SDGs, this partnership is an international, multidisciplinary network of decision-makers in a variety of sectors whose aim is to support the implementation of the SDGs through policy, white papers, and impact-driven projects.



UNESCO and Ericsson Artificial Intelligence (AI) Initiative for Youth

Supporting the achievement of SDG 4, this public-private partnership brings

together partners with different strengths to develop a digital skill learning program to scale up AI, and other key digital skills, for young people.



The Private Sector Advisory Council on the SDGs

Supporting the achievement of SDG 5, this cross sectoral partnership is a collaboration between the UAE National Committee on SDGs and the private sector. One of Council's flagship initiatives is the pledge of more than 40 national and multinational companies in the UAE to achieve at least 30% of women in senior management and leadership positions by 2025.



Private Sector Coalition

In line with SDG 13, Majid Al Futtaim formed a coalition of multinational

private sector companies based in the UAE and the Arab region that developed and implemented a regulation on single use plastic. Through cross sectoral partnerships and based on data and community engagement, Majid Al Futtaim aims to launch projects on areas such as climate technology and youth start-ups.
